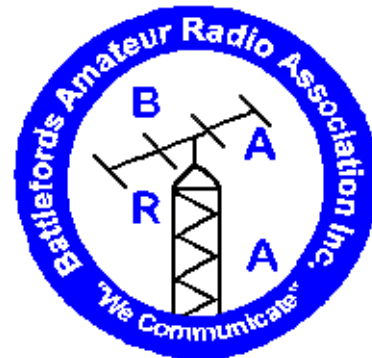

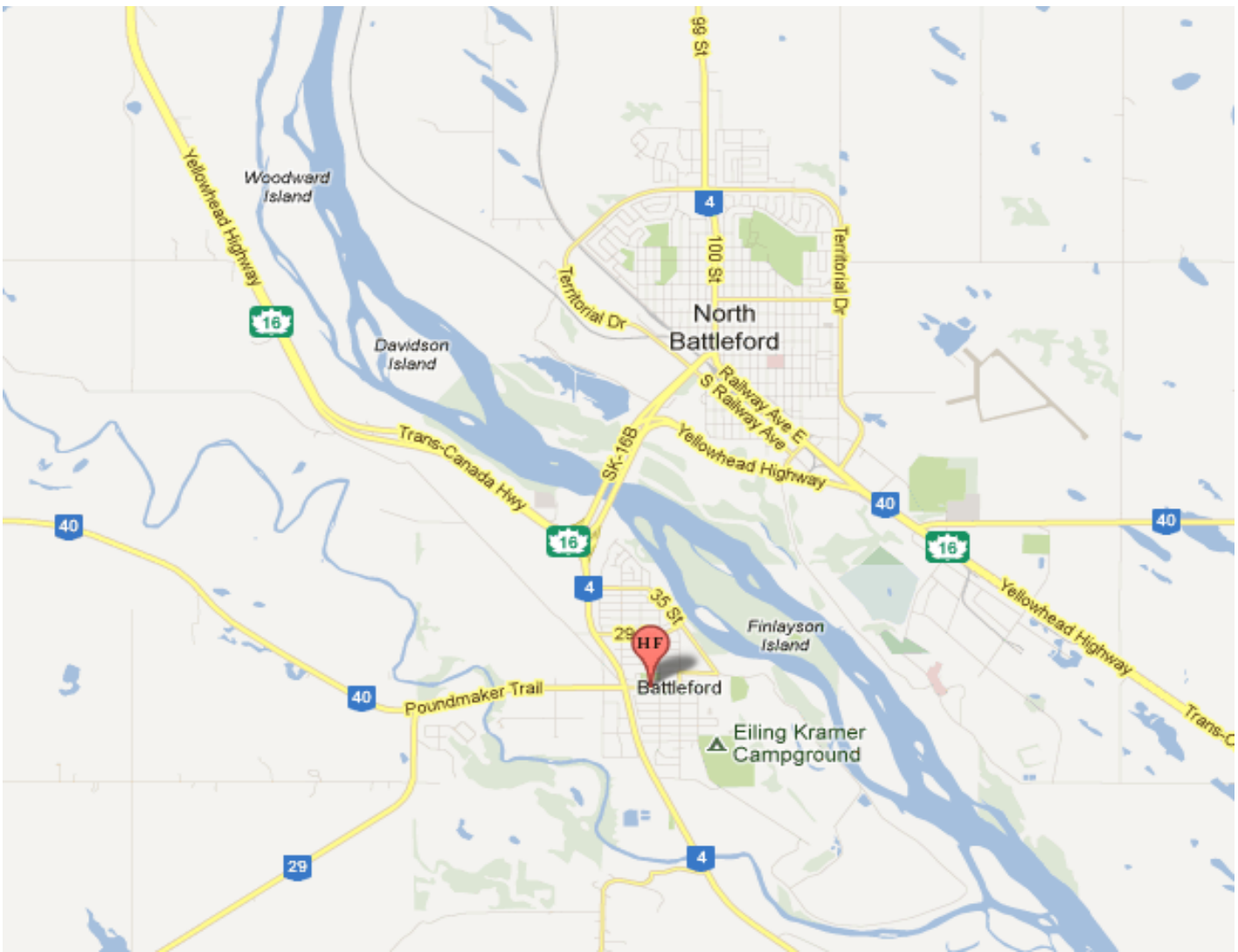

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

From the “Last Mountain” I shall write up my observations of hamdom in Saskatchewan in “ought thirteen”. This is the mid year installment.

The repeater on the mountain was getting more and more disagreeable with the advancing weeks, and by May, something had to be done. Using it meant that one had to make sure the elements of the QSO were passed swiftly because after the machine had been operating for about three minutes, the sensitivity seemed to diminish and all manner of noises would put an end to any further use. That story reminds me of the telephone system when I was a kid, long distance calls were rare and treasured events. Sometimes the lines were noisy making communication difficult and the adults were always conscious of that unseen “clock” running, somewhere, dropping quarters down a slot, the total number to appear on the following month’s statement. Consequently, little visiting of the kind we know went on over the long distance wires. Mostly, greetings, the reason for the call and a hurried goodbye were the order of

priority.

We use the modern “long distance” service daily and hardly think about how it was developed and the cost is a mere fraction of what it once was. When cousin Laurelie was visiting us from New Zealand nearly 20 years ago, she noticed my tri-band beam and said that her father was a long time ham and maybe we could arrange a QSO. I thought that this would be a chance encounter at best because I had not heard a ZL station for many years on 20 metres. Laurelie phoned her father Brad, ZL1FF and made a sked for 20 metres at a time that I considered most likely for success. He was using a FT-101 feeding a long wire held up by apple trees, but we did have a QSO that afternoon and at least one more after that. Brad was an old CW operator from generations past so we did have to resort to that mode before the QSO ended.

This past weekend marked annual Radio Amateur Field Day. I have heard from a few participants and the reports describe a quite enjoyable exercise. I was able to visit the site of the Regina Amateur Radio

Association’s field day set up near the Science Centre and Wascana Lake. I spoke with a few of the operators on the Sunday morning shift. The physical set up was well done with a real antenna farm that had been erected on short notice but appeared to have a lot of planning involved. Stalwarts Terry and Doug were busy keeping the reports going out but they reported there had been some new operators on shift Saturday and expected them back on Sunday morning. Field day is quite a good training experience for new hams.

The annual General Meeting of the S.A.R.L is to be held during the Battleford Hamfest on July 27th. Everyone is welcome to attend and voice concerns and maybe learn more about what other members are thinking and concerned about in the world of Amateur Radio. Thanks everyone, see you there, 73

NORTH-WEST REPORT

The Northeast region has had a relatively busy start into this year of Amateur Radio. This spring, the local EMO put on an event in the Tisdale Mall parking lot aimed at making the public aware of the services and equipment available to the community in case of emergency. It was great to see all the Amateur Radio Operators who were a part of this. Hams were represented in the Red Cross, the Fire Department, the EMS

operators, transportation operators and, of course, the EMO itself. It appears that Radio Amateurs are excellent volunteers for the benefit of their community. Local Amateurs provided communications for the area's "MS Walk" event, which raised over \$11000. Later the hams came out again to provide security and communications for the local "Relay for Life" event which raised over \$140,000 even though the rainy season forced it indoors. Well done, Amateurs! We really need to "blow our own horns" more. While we contribute a great deal to our communities, the general public continues to be quite unaware of our existence. We are fortunate, in the Tisdale area, that our local EMO is a strong supporter of Amateur Radio to the extent that they completely underwrite the costs associated with our repeater.

Near the end of June, several hams from Tisdale and Melfort came out for a Ham-B-Q at the home of VE5FL and VE5FX and were able to enjoy an outdoor evening around the fire without getting rained on.

FINES FOR IMPROPER USE OF AMATEUR RADIO

More changes to Radiocommunication

Please find below, the information regarding the repealing of the previous legislation governing the use of obscene or profane language.

In regard to the use of profane or obscene language, Section 32, of the Radiocommunication Regulations, which had previously contained a prohibition against these activities, has been repealed as of October 17, 2011. There is therefore no longer any prohibition in regard to the use of profane or obscene language.

Owing to the loss of this prohibition, it now falls to the Amateur Community to promote the discouragement of these practices which may result in the creation of a significant barrier toward the use of Amateur Radio by young amateurs, families and to the promotion of the hobby to both new and existing

operators.

In regard to the willful interference to Radiocommunications: Section 9.1 (b) of the Radiocommunication Act, states in part that:

"No person shall"... "(b) without lawful excuse, interfere with or obstruct any Radiocommunication;"

Due to the limited resources available to the Department, enforcement action is prioritized according the perceived over-all impact to the Radio Frequency Spectrum. Safety, Emergency, Broadcast, Government and Commercial services are afforded priority for these resources. The Amateur Radio Service has been for the most part, considered to be a self-policing service.

Most operators tend to operate well within the rules and regulations and the Amateur Community has been known to be quite effective in curtailing the majority of illegal practices by operators.

In the event that such self-policing should prove ineffective, the Department may determine that enforcement action is required in order to obtain compliance.

It is in the best interest of the Amateur Community to promote the self-policing model among its members.
